ALICE Report

Deann Cook, Executive Director, United Ways of Iowa presented the ALICE Report. Cook represents the 25 United Way associations statewide. ALICE, Asset-Limited, Income-Constrained, Employed, places a spotlight on a large population of hardworking Iowans who work at low-wage

jobs, have little or no savings, and are one emergency away from falling into poverty and crisis.

The United Way ALICE Report is a comprehensive depiction of financial needs in the state to date, using data from a variety of sources, including the US Census. Data is available on the state, county, and municipal level. The report unveils measures, based on present-day income levels and expenses that show how many lowa workers are struggling financially, and why. ALICE represents a growing number of individuals and families who are working but are unable to afford the basic necessities of housing, food, childcare, health care and transportation. Although ALICE is earning income, pays taxes, and contributes to lowa's economy, the household income is not enough to meet a basic survival budget in these categories.

Cook walked members through the history and methodology used to determine the survival budgets. She then shared statewide and Polk County data.

Rob Barron asked if information was available by zip codes. Cook will ask and share information with staff for distribution

After the ALICE presentation Cook facilitated use of the online "Making Tough Choices" interactive which simulates situations faced by ALICE households based on a month of income and expenses. Cook offered to present the ALICE information to groups board members participate in.

December's board meeting will be held in Rooms 200 and 205 on the second floor of the United Way building. The meeting will include working time for the Early Childhood and School Ready committees.
